Monica Czausz

An increasingly sought-after recitalist, Monica Czausz has performed at major events including the 2016 National Convention of the AGO in Houston, Texas both as a “Rising Star” and as Cathedral Organist for Evensong at Christ Church Cathedral, and the 2016 Organ Historical Society National Convention in Bryn Athyn Pennsylvania. After her performance at the 2015 East Texas Organ Festival in Kilgore, Texas, The Tracker reported that, “This young lady just blew us all away.”

You do not want to miss this concert ... here is a personal note from Jim Hejduk regarding Monica's playing: *I'd like to make a special plug for our upcoming Lincoln Organ Showcase recital by Monica Czausz (pronounced "Chouse," rhymes with "house" ~ I think!). I heard Monica play a breath-taking recital on the iconic Aeolian-Skinner at First Baptist Church in Longview, TX as part of the East Texas Pipe Organ Festival in 2015. She also received rave reviews at both the AGO and OHS national conventions this past summer. And she has just been added to the roster of Karen McFarlane Artists. Monica is finishing up a master's degree as a student of Ken Cowan at Rice University. You do not want to miss this opportunity to hear this remarkable young artist and urge you to attend.*

Know a Volunteer Organist Who Should Be an AGO Member?

The AGO National Council is excited to introduce a pilot program establishing a new category of membership for “Volunteer Organists.” If the pilot program is successful, this new AGO membership category will be available for any musicians who earn less than \$1,000 per year while serving as organists and/or choir directors. During the pilot period, the offer will be extended only to those who have attended an educational workshop for volunteer organists hosted by Don Cook. This complimentary, introductory membership includes all the benefits of a regular AGO membership with one exception. Volunteer Members may access TAO on-line, but will not receive a copy in the postal mail each month.

After the initial complimentary six-month period, Volunteer Members will be given the option to continue their membership at a discounted rate of \$50.00 per year with the same benefits package. RCYO Competition Update

RCYO (Regional Chapter Young Organist) competitions coincide with Regional Conventions on alternating years with the National Competition. The Lincoln Chapter will hold a competition for our singular competitor on *Saturday, March 11, at 11 a.m. at St. Paul United Methodist Church, 1144 “M” St., Lincoln.* The competitor is required to play a hymn during the competition in addition to their repertoire list. **I encourage any and all AGO members (and non-members) to attend the competition to support the competitor and sing the hymn with verve and vigor.**

This year we have fifty-seven (57) competitors spread across twenty-seven (27) participating cities from regions across the U.S. The breakdown as follows:

- **5 competitors each:** Los Angeles, Salt Lake City
- **3 competitors each:** Indianapolis, Atlanta, New York City
- **2 competitors each:** Boston, Buffalo, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Wash. DC, Charlotte, Knoxville, Cleveland, Grand Rapids, Minneapolis-St. Paul, Wichita, Baylor, Ft. Worth, Salem, San Francisco
- **1 competitor each:** Tulsa, **Lincoln**, Milwaukee, Columbus, Harrisburg, Tidewater, Bridgeport

I don’t have any figures for contestants, regions or cities from previous years, so I’m unable to compare this year’s competition numbers from previous years in that regard. I can only state that the average this year is approximately 2 competitors per city. In my opinion, the closing of organ departments at various conservatories, colleges/universities across the country over the past decade, changing trends in music styles in multi-denominational houses of worship, woefully inadequate salaries, (compared to the cost of a four-year degree in organ/liturgical music study) and “volunteer” positions have deterred pianists/piano majors from organ study. My church musician friends in Boston (where I resided for 38 yrs. before returning to Nebraska), a city with a history of saturation in the performing arts, tell me of their frustrations in finding organ substitutes at their respective churches, while some churches struggle to hire a regular organist/music director. As with many fads and trends in our culture, the pendulum swings in both directions, and nothing lasts forever. Hopefully, this will be the case with traditional liturgical music as well.
