# Dean's Letter

The chapter executive committee met a couple of weeks ago after an outstanding organ concert by Monica Czausz. We discussed how wonderful the concert was, and how disappointing the attendance was. Just this past Sunday, my congregation hosted a wonderful pianist in a concert of truly interesting and lovely music. The concert left the attendees on a real "high", however, attendance was low. My congregational president turned to me and asked, "What will it take to get people to come to these things?"

That really is a good question. Both concerts I mentioned were promoted both within the churches and in the newspapers. One was promoted on Facebook. One was promoted on the radio (Friday Live). What will it take to get people to come to classical concerts hosted by churches? Obviously, a few churches in Lincoln have well-established concert series, and yay for that! But what can the rest of us do? What can Lincoln Organ Showcase do about hosting world-class artists who end up playing for less than 50 people? How can we help people to see the value and beauty in what we offer?

I realize the above might seem kind of negative, but that isn't how I mean it. I believe that local congregations provide a layer of richness to our community by providing a space for some fantastic concerts that are affordable to all. I believe there is value in a volunteer church choir doing a concert of sacred music for a freewill offering. I know – people are busy. There are a million other things they could be doing. But I'm not ready to give up, and I hope you aren't either. We have a role to play in helping people learn about and value the music of our instrument (and music in general). Do you have ideas for encouraging people to attend organ or sacred music concerts? 


# Abendmusik at First-Plymouth Children's Choir Festival

One topic of discussion was Lincoln Organ Showcase. The next season has four participants firmly committed, with a possibility of a fifth wanting to be on the schedule as well. The general consensus was that the series this past year has been very good artistically-speaking, but that the board is disappointed in attendance. Ideas for increasing attendance and exposure were discussed; as well as discussion about increasing chapter membership. More discussion to follow in upcoming meetings.

Next chapter meeting is March 11th (RCYO competition) and all is well in hand for that. No meeting in April, and then an LOS recital at First Christian on May 7th. The board is considering some kind of fun social event as a wrap-up to our season in early June.

The executive committee approved further exploring the idea of co-sponsoring a workshop featuring John Ferguson when he is here for a hymn festival in the next program year.

The nominating committee will be forming shortly and working on finding nominees for the executive committee.

Budget-wise, both income and expenses are lower than we had anticipated, but we are on trend to be ok financially this year.
