Introducing the new Music Building at Concordia University



In April 2021, Concordia University in Seward broke ground on a new 46,000 square foot facility which will be home to Concordia's music department. To meet current building, fire, and accessibility codes, the plans included demolishing and replacing the east wing of the 1966 structure and renovating the remaining west wing. After many delays, the department is expected to move into the

facility during Christmas break. Concordia looks forward to inviting the chapter to Seward when the building is completed for tours and events!

To prepare to empty the building before demolition, Mark, Ryan, and the crew from Bedient Pipe Organ Company spent several months disassembling and packing each of Concordia's 10 practice organs and taking copious notes on repairs to be made to each instrument. A 14-man crew from Bedient and Nebraskaland Moving then spent two days moving pipe trays, consoles, and windchests around tight corners, up a narrow staircase and out of the building after making a tight 90-degree turn on a small stairwell landing. These crews did amazing work and the instruments have been stored in an unfinished science classroom in the Dunklau Center right next to the music building. The console for the Casavant recital hall organ was removed and the chests covered, sealed, and protected from dust with a negative pressure, filtered blower. The crews from Bedient and Nebraskaland Moving will meet again on November 1 and 2 to move the organs back into the music building, but they are thankful for the new hospital-sized elevator that will eliminate the need for the steps.
