

BEDIENT PIPE ORGAN COMPANY UPDATE



The Bedient Pipe Organ Company of Lincoln, NE has completed a major rebuild and expansion of a Kilgen & Son organ at Trinity Lutheran Church in McPherson, Kansas.

This organ has been a part of the congregation since it was installed in their “red-brick church” in 1938. A new sanctuary was built in 1970, along with a fellowship hall, classrooms, and offices. At first, there were no plans to move the organ into the new sanctuary. A last minute decision saved the organ, but no space had been prepared for installing it. Temporary chambers were created behind the altar with hopes of enlarging them someday. The congregation voted to renovate and update the sanctuary in 2018. The organ was a central part of those renovations.

The organ was essentially unaltered when it was moved in 1970 and its original voicing style had been retained. The chests and reservoirs were due for releathering and decades of dust had accumulated. The biggest problem was service access. It was nearly impossible to enter the chambers for tuning. Tonal egress was also limited because of very small expression shade openings.

New organ chambers are cantilevered out and above the back of the chancel. The larger chambers not only allow much better service access, but also make room for the addition of eight new voices. The first priority was selecting ranks that would enhance the organ’s ability to lead worship and congregational singing. The second goal was ensuring that all the additions would be in the same tonal aesthetic as the original Kilgen stops. It was very important that no stop sounded “added on”. A clear Fifteenth and rich, low-pitched Mixture in the Great lead congregational singing. A dark chorus Tuba enhances the plenum and is extended to the pedal to provide a 16’ Tromba. A facade was designed using the new Double Open Diapason, adding clarity to the abundant existing pedal stops. A Geigen Principal 4’ was added to the Swell to create a secondary principal chorus. The former Great Trumpet was moved to the Swell where it serves as both a solo and chorus reed. Vintage Vox Humana and Unda Maris ranks round out the additions. The new expression shades are nearly twice as large as the old shades and the organ speaks clearly into the room. A Virtuoso Control System provides many additional registration aids and unlimited memory levels.



Two weeks of tonal finishing brought out an incredible amount of color from the individual stops. They now can be combined in numerous, creative ways for leading worship and playing a wide range of organ literature. A dedication recital will be scheduled at a later date.





A NEW ORGAN FOR SAINT MARY'S!

She already has worked to help the high school daughter of a friend be introduced to the organ and take lessons at her church as well! They are learning together and from each other. Rose is preparing music to play for her niece's wedding that will happen in a few months. What a celebration of new things—a new marriage and family with music on a new organ! 


HERITAGE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN LINCOLN


Nathan is a second year student at Concordia University hoping to serve a local church after graduation.

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HISTORIC MUSCATINE ORGAN WILL PLAY ON IN NEBRASKA

When St. Mary Church in Muscatine closed this past summer, members of Ss. Mary & Mathias Parish faced a conundrum: what to do with the pipe organ. More than a sentimental item, the Organ Historic Society considers the 1877 Pfeiffer organ to be one of the oldest working organs in the Midwest. Clergy and parishioners struggled to find a buyer. "There are many old organs and not that many churches seeking existing instruments," said Mark Miller, vice president of Bedient Pipe Organ Company in Lincoln, Neb. As the closing of the church approached, parish leaders had received interest but no concrete bids, said Tom Hickey, Ss. Mary & Mathias parish council president. The parish considered storing it, or donating it to an organ museum, but the hope was to find a church that would use the instrument. When St. Patrick Parish in Lincoln, Neb., expressed interest in buying, fixing and installing the old organ in its new church, Ss. Mary & Mathias breathed a collective sigh of relief. "It was one of the key symbols of the church that (we) wanted to preserve going forward," Hickey said. St. Patrick Parish purchased the organ for \$1,000, and intends to place it in the new church building, which is currently under construction. The organ's selling price was far under its value, but Hickey said the parish accepted the bid because of the considerable cost to St. Patrick of dismantling, moving, repairing and installing the organ. "The St. Mary parishioners felt it was a good solution, especially that a Catholic church would continue using it." He added that, while some interested parishes turned away from purchasing the organ due to its specific dimensions, St. Patrick Parish had the flexibility of working with its architect to ensure that the building could be designed to hold the organ. 2/21/2021 Historic Muscatine pipe organ will play on in Nebraska <https://www.printfriendly.com/p/g/3YbcAp> 2/2 In August, Bedient Pipe Organ Company spent four days in Muscatine removing the organ and preparing it for shipment to the company's headquarters, where the organ will be refurbished. In order to remove the organ, parts of the banister and several pews were removed. Kevin Foley, Ss. Mary & Mathias' bid coordinator, described the process as tricky, meticulous, and sometimes heavy work. "The Bedient team removed the casework and placed each of the roughly 1,000 pipes in pine boxes for shipment. The 8-foot by 8-foot, 400-plus-pound wind chest (which resembles a bellows, responsible for maintaining and regulating air pressure and delivery to the pipes) was carefully maneuvered to the edge of the choir loft balcony and lowered to ground level via scissor-lifts," Foley said. Despite the labor and cost involved with moving and restoring an old organ — Muscatine parishioners estimated removal alone at \$25,000 — Miller of the organ company said St. Patrick is making a good investment, and other parishes building new churches shouldn't be afraid to do the same. "Although acquiring, moving, installing and renewing a vintage pipe organ is costly, it generally is less than a new instrument." The Associated Pipe Organ Builders of America estimate the cost and installation of a new pipe organ for a small-to-medium-sized church to be in the \$200,000 to \$850,000 range. The organ is being stored at Bedient's facility near Lincoln. St. Patrick's is raising the necessary funds to repair and install the organ in the new church, expected to be completed mid-summer 2015. Once the renovated organ is installed, former parishioners of St. Mary will be invited to visit the new St. Patrick's church and enjoy the treasured instrument. Miller said it will be one of the oldest mechanical action pipe organs in the area in what is planned to be an "outstanding acoustic space." Bedient president Paul Lytle, who is supervising the project, called the organ "a gem worth preserving," adding that the process of breathing new life into the organ "demonstrates good stewardship for all involved." With good care, he said, the organ should continue to play for at least another 100 years.


